### Track 1—*Thrombosis*

This track will feature discussions of new and controversial issues regarding the use of heparins, warfarin and newer agents, such as pentasaccharides and oral direct thrombin inhibitors, in treating deep vein thrombosis; the complexities associated with anticoagulant therapy in special populations; and the controversies surrounding the use of anti-thrombotic therapy in cardiovascular disease.

### Track 2—*Chronic Kidney Disease: Filtering the Facts*

Discussions will also include the management of hypertension, diabetes, dyslipidemia, and smoking in chronic kidney disease; the treatments to delay progression and manage secondary complications of chronic kidney disease; current issues in the care of patients with endstage renal disease; and the role of renal replacement therapies.

The track concludes on Wednesday with a discussion concerning drug promotion and marketing from three perspectives: industry, FDA, and the clinical pharmacist.

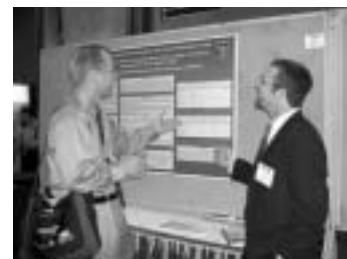

### COMBATING BACTERIAL RESISTANCE IN PEDIATRIC COMMUNITY-ACQUIRED INFECTIONS

Community-acquired bacterial infections in children can include otitis media, sinusitis, cellulitis, pneumonia, and meningitis, among others, and they account for a significant percentage of pediatric contact with health professionals. For example, otitis media alone results in approximately 25-30 million office visits per year. And while there have been recent trends toward reductions in use of antimicrobials in children and adolescents, there continues to be millions of unnecessary prescriptions written for antibiotics annually. This is particularly concerning in the current era of increasing microbial resistance, to which over-prescribing contributes significantly. Since the early 1980s, the incidence of penicillin non-susceptible *Streptococcus pneumoniae* has increased significantly, ranging from 15% to almost 40% in some regions of the country. Community-acquired methicillin-resistant *Staphylococcus aureus* has also recently become a significant pathogen, and recent data show that it is more likely to strike younger rather than older patients. These changes in the epidemiology of common pathogens in children have forced clinicians to utilize antibiotics not considered first-line therapy. Some of these agents do not have FDA approval in children and may have scant data in pediatric patients with which to help make prescribing decisions. This symposium will strive to address the changing epidemiology of community-acquired pathogens in children, and to provide attendees with the latest review of the efficacy and safety of new and established agents that may be utilized.

# THE ESSENTIALS OF CRITICAL CARE PHARMACY PRACTICE: A CASE-BASED SYMPOSIUM
